#### 2019 RESULTS

The papers and mark schemes for all Components are now available to view on our <u>secure</u> <u>website</u>. If you don't have access to the relevant pages, please contact your Exams Officer, who will be able to grant you the appropriate permissions via a new password.

The 19<sup>th</sup> of September is the last date where a review of marking and/or moderation can be requested. Electronic copies of scripts from your centre can be requested up to the 26<sup>th</sup> of September. Please see our <u>website</u> for more details of our post-results services.

Eduqas offers two services to help you understand your students' results and develop their exam skills: Exam Results Analysis and Online Exam Review.

**Exam Results Analysis** (Item Level Data) on the <u>secure website</u> allows you to compare your students' performance on each question with that of the candidature overall, letting you see where they have done well and where there might be room for improvement.

Online Exam Review provides a number of marked exemplars of candidate responses to key questions in an interactive format. These can be used as teaching resources, allowing students to mark others' work and discuss ways in which it may be improved, thus developing their own skills. Exemplars from the summer examinations will be uploaded during this first half-term period.

# **EXAMINER REPORTS AS/A level**

The Principal Examiner reports provide detailed feedback on candidate performance in each Component at AS and A level are now available on the website subject page.

## INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATION FEEDBACK

Once again, some truly excellent work was seen and we would like to thank centres for all their hard work. Further marked exemplars will be made available on the secure website over the coming weeks. We are also developing a fully annotated mark scheme that will be published shortly to give additional help and guidance on applying the marking criteria effectively and consistently when marking work.

As many of you will currently be preparing students for 2020 submissions, I would like to take this opportunity to remind centres of a few important points regarding the NEA:

- In some instances, greater use could still be made of the <u>Student Proposal Form</u>. This should form the basis for a dialogue between candidate and teacher. These discussions should ensure that the candidate has an appropriate and manageable title. Many are still attempting too much at the outset
- Please refer to the <u>exemplar proposal forms and guidance</u> provided on the open and secure websites for further details on how to guide your candidates appropriately. Where a centre is uncertain of the suitability of a particular title, please use the <u>Title Advice</u>



- <u>Service</u> that we offer. The Title Advice Form is available in the 'Related Documents' section of the WJEC GCE Geography website
- Each individual candidate must complete their proposal form in full <u>before</u> collecting any data
- <u>Teacher annotations</u> should be concise and <u>clearly linked to the marking criteria</u>. Rather than being descriptive of the work, they should focus on the quality of what is being marked when judged against the criteria
- Many students still write far more than the guided 3-4,000 words. Often, this is a direct result of a candidate attempting too much or having too broad a focus for their title. Teachers should guide students to refine titles and narrow them down where necessary so that the fieldwork and write-up is manageable within the word count and the time they have available.

2020 Independent Investigation samples will need to be submitted by Friday, 20th of March.

# **EDUQAS CPD DATES 2019**
